ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

Between

Lansing Community College

A.A. Degree in Anthropology

And

Northern Michigan University

College of Arts and Sciences B.S. Degree in Anthropology

(October 11, 2024)

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Article I Agreement on Principle

Northern Michigan University and Lansing Community College agree that students who choose to transfer from a community college to a senior college or university to earn a bachelor's degree should be provided with a smooth curriculum transition that minimizes loss of credit and duplication of coursework. Therefore, Northern Michigan University and Lansing Community College agree to enter into this curriculum articulation agreement for students who complete the Associate of Arts in Anthropology at Lansing Community College and transfer to NMU to complete the Bachelors of Science in Anthropology. Both institutions enter into this agreement as cooperating, equal partners who shall maintain the integrity of their separate programs. To the extent permitted by law, Northern Michigan University and Lansing Community College agree to indemnify and hold one another harmless from any and all claims initiated by student participants, their parents, survivors, or agents, arising from any negligent acts or omission on the part of either institution or any of their employees.

Article II Agreement on Program Specifics

Northern Michigan University and Lansing Community College agree that any student who has successfully completed the minimum requirements outlined on the attached articulation guide may transfer the course credits indicated toward the Bachelors of Science in Anthropology at Northern Michigan University. Students who follow this articulated program agreement must apply and be admitted to Northern Michigan University. Lansing Community College students will receive equal consideration with other students seeking admission and financial aid. The bachelor's degree graduation requirements for students who follow this articulated program agreement are listed on the attached articulation guide.

Article III Agreement on Communication

Northern Michigan University and Lansing Community College agree to cooperate in communication with each other and with their common and respective publics concerning the established relationship between the two institutions. Communication may include the development of various kinds of publications to inform those who might benefit personally or professionally from the opportunities provided by this agreement. Faculty and staff at both institutions will share the information in this agreement with interested and qualified students and both institutions will provide counseling and advising to students and prospective students.

Article IV Agreement on Maintenance and Review Procedures

At least one administrative or faculty member from each institution will be appointed to act as agents for the implementation of this agreement, to speak for the institutions and to communicate changes to respective faculty members, advisors, counselors, and others to whom the information is pertinent. Responsibility for oversight of this agreement rests with the Director of Academic Quality at Lansing Community College and the Associate Provost for Academic Affairs at Northern Michigan University

Both parties agree to communicate annually any changes in their respective programs that may affect this articulation agreement. During the third year, both parties will review the agreement for revision and possible renewal. If the agreement is not reviewed by the end of the effective agreement, Lansing Community College students who started the articulated program prior to termination of the agreement, will be given three additional years to be admitted to NMU under terms of this agreement

Note Regarding Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA): Students who transfer to Northern Michigan University from a Michigan community college and who have <u>Michigan Transfer Agreement Satisfied</u> posted on their transcript will be considered to have met the requirements of NMU's General Education program. Students will still be expected to complete all other degree requirements, including graduation requirements (World Cultures requirement, Laboratory Science requirement, and Math and English Competency requirement) and any courses listed as "Other Required Courses" that may also be General Education courses. Degree requirements can be found at www.nmu.edu/catalog. Transfer students who do not complete the entire block of courses required by the MTA will receive credit for courses they do complete on the basis of individual evaluation and established transfer equivalencies.

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Effective Dates of this Articulation Agreement October 31, 2024-October 31, 2027

Introduction:

The purpose of this articulation agreement is to provide a smooth transition for students who want to earn an A.A. degree in Anthropology at Lansing Community College prior to a transfer to Northern Michigan University to complete a B.S. degree in Anthropology. As displayed in this document, the first and second years of coursework are completed at Lansing Community College and third and fourth years at NMU.

The Department of Sociology and Anthropology offers major and minor programs in both Sociology and Anthropology. The department also participates in the interdisciplinary minors in gender studies, international studies and crime scene investigation. (See the "Interdisciplinary and Individually Created Programs" and "International Studies" sections of the NMU catalog.)

Students who pursue a degree in Anthropology at NMU explore the vast diversity of human culture and biology, past and present, through a holistic, four-field perspective. The Department offers concentrations in Sociocultural Anthropology, Archaeology, Biological Anthropology, and General Anthropology. Throughout the program, students develop critical thinking and research skills and utilize anthropological methods to analyze what it means to be human. Experiential learning through fieldwork, internship opportunities, lab work, and interdisciplinary research help students apply anthropological concepts to real-world issues like social justice, environmental sustainability, and public health. Additionally, with its direct connection to the Center for Forensic Science, the Department of Sociology and Anthropology offers students interested in careers in forensic anthropology and related fields the potential to gain marketable experience by conducting research or volunteering in the Forensic Anthropology Research Laboratory or the Forensic Research Outdoor Station, one of only a handful of outdoor human decomposition research facilities in the world. The department faculty are deeply committed to mentoring students in ethics, professionalism, and ways in which their Anthropology degree can help them in whichever career path they choose.

Effective Dates:

The effective dates of this agreement are from **October 31, 2024 – October 31, 2027**. If this agreement is not renewed at the end of the effective period, students who have already started this articulated program at Lansing Community College will be given three additional years to be admitted to NMU under the terms of this agreement. Students, who began the program prior to the effective date, may use the agreement to the extent that the requirements completed are consistent with this agreement.

First and Second Years at Lansing Community College:

The first and second years of this agreement will be an AA degree in Anthropology at Lansing Community College. The third and fourth years of this agreement will be at Northern Michigan University and will result in a Bachelors Degree in Anthropology. A maximum of 90 semester credits may transfer to NMU from a two-year college. Unless otherwise designated, a grade of C- or higher is required for transfer to NMU. The Anthropology major requires both a concentration and a minor. The following section is of Lansing Community College's A.A. degree with restricted selections to meet the Michigan Transfer Agreement.

Additional Graduation Requirements:

- 1. At least 8 credits of the major and 4 credits of the minor must be earned at NMU.
- 2. A total of 120 credit hours with a minimum of 30 earned at NMU, and a minimum NMU GPA of 2.0 must be earned for any degree.
- 3. Any minimum grade or GPA requirements for the major and/or minor must be met.
- 4. NMU's General Education Program and all graduation requirements must be completed by the student, including the World Cultures requirement, Laboratory Science requirement, and Math and English Competency requirement.

Notes to Students:

- 1. Complete the articulated program as indicated in this articulation guide. Any course substitutions should only be made with the guidance of an advisor or counselor to assure that all requirements are met;
- 2. Students are encouraged to meet with the transfer coordinator at NMU early, before completing an admission application to NMU; and
- 3. A copy of the articulation agreement should be brought to all advising sessions. Copies of this agreement are available on the NMU Undergraduate Admissions Website and at the Academic Affairs Office, NMU.
